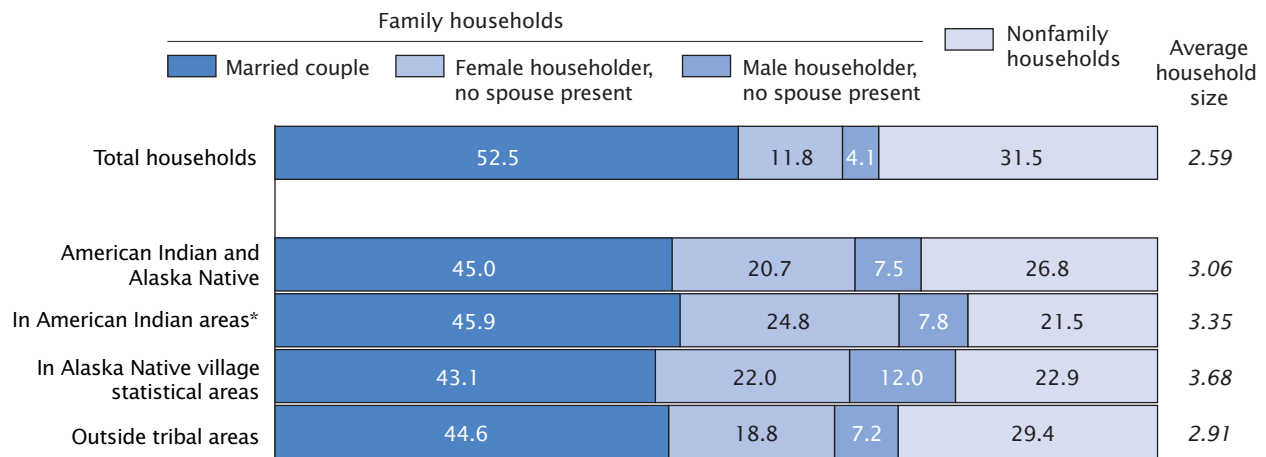


The largest proportion of family households was found in tribal areas.

- Overall, 73 percent of all American Indian and Alaska Native households were family households, compared with 68 percent of all U.S. households. By place of residence, the percentages of American Indian and Alaska Native households in AIAs and those in ANVSAs that were family households were greater than the percentage of family households outside tribal areas (71 percent).
- The proportion of family households maintained by women with no husband present in AIAs was more than twice that of all households. Married-couple family households represented a lower proportion of households outside tribal areas than in AIAs and all U.S. households.
